


Trinity ISE II – Collaborative Task Pair Work 2

Use these questions to help you create your backstory. Write down notes with your ideas.


Why didn't you go to university?	What job do you do now?

What would you have studied?	What would have been different if you had gone?
Can you still go now?	Are there any positives from not having gone?
In what ways would your life improve?	Why is university not always an option?
